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It's official...Project Safe Neighborhoods Rated "Promising"

In April 2016, CrimeSOLUTIONS.gov (<u>https://www.crimesolutions.gov/default.aspx</u>) officially recognized Project Safe Neighborhoods as a "Promising Practice" based on evidence garnered through the Michigan State University, School of Criminal Justice PSN National Evaluation. CrimeSOLUTIONS.gov states, "Cities that received a higher dosage of PSN were significantly more likely to experience decreases in violent crime than cities that did not fully implement PSN. For additional information on the Violence Reduction Assessment Tool please visit: <u>http://</u> www.psnmsu.com/vrat/ The Violence Reduction Assessment Tool (VRAT) is a new planning resource for communities engaged in strategic efforts to reduce violent crime. Developed in collaboration with BJA, the VRAT assists communities with 1) assessing their local violent crime problem; 2) identifying evidence-based and promising strategies for reducing violent crime; 3) assessing their capacity to effectively implement a violence reduction strategy; and 4) linking communities to resources to accomplish the first three goals.

The online instrument takes approximately 15-30 minutes to complete. Key dimensions include: Governance and Project Management, Partnerships, Data and Analysis, and Feedback and Awareness. Aggregated results for teams of four or more participants are provided along with suggestions useful for planning and setting a benchmark for assessing progress.
